
# The Common Sense Census: Media Use by Kids Age Zero to Eight, 2020 Hispanic/Latinx Children's Media Use

# Before the coronavirus pandemic, Hispanic/Latinx children from birth to age 8 spent an average of






# Over the years, young Hispanic/Latinx children's daily screen time has remained fairly stable.



## However, there has been a large increase in mobile media use.




# For young Hispanic/Latinx children, more than half of the time on mobile devices in 2020, before the coronavirus pandemic, was spent watching videos.






# Young Hispanic/Latinx children's ownership and access to media has increased over time but has remained fairly stable since 2017.



# Even children age 8 and younger had their own personal devices before the coronavirus pandemic.






### Top media concerns of Hispanic/Latinx parents of young children include:

- 1. Sexual content in media: 55% were "very concerned"
- 2. Cyberbullying online: 53% were "very concerned"
- 3. Violent content in media: 50% were "very concerned"

of Hispanic/Latinx parents said that learning is a "very important" reason their child uses screen media.




of Hispanic/Latinx parents said that the media their child uses helps "a lot" with learning.
